Happy Chinese New Year

Ming Shu (Chinese astrology) is believed to date back to 2637 B.C.E. when Emperor Huang Ti first introduced a calendar based on the cycles of the moon. Ironically, the word “shu” means “reckoning of fate.”

The Chinese astrological cycle takes 12 years to complete. There are twelve signs, each represented by an animal. According to an old Chinese story, before Confucius died, he was asked to bless all of the animals in China. The story tells that only twelve animals decided to come before him. It are these animals that are used in their calendar.

Similar to Western astrology, someone’s personality is governed by these animals’ signs. In addition, the Chinese believe that the elements metal, air, water, wood, and fire play a major part in how people act. To each of these elements we are positive (yang) or negative (yin) in our ways.



Chinese New Year starts with the new moon on the first day of the regular New Year and ends on the next full moon, fifteen days later. The 15th day of the Chinese New Year is called the Lantern Festival. This is celebrated at night and young children carry lanterns in a parade.

The Chinese calendar is based on a combination of both lunar and solar movements. The lunar cycle is about 29.5 days. In order to “catch-up” with the solar calendar, the Chinese add an extra month every few years out of a 19 year cycle. This is the same as adding an extra day to create a Leap Year. This is why Chinese New Year falls on a different day each year.

New Year’s Eve and New Year’s Day are family times for reunion and thanksgiving. It starts with a religious ceremony to honor Heaven and Earth, the Buddhist gods of the household, and the family ancestors. Departed relatives are remembered with great respect as they were responsible for creating the family foundations. At the New Year’s Eve dinner, the “weilu,” a place for each departed ancestor is left in their honor.

Chinese New Year Traditions



While many Chinese today may not believe in these “do’s” and “don’ts”, these traditions and customs are still practiced in many parts of China. They are kept because the family believes that they provide continuity with the past and family identify for the future.

On New Year’s Eve, all brushes, brooms, dusters, and pans must be put away. Sweeping or dusting cannot be done until New Year’s Day for fear that good fortune will be swept away. After New Year’s Day, all dust and rubbish must be swept to the middle of the floor, picked up then put in the corners of the room. It cannot be thrown out until the fifth day, then only through the back door.

All debts must be paid up by New Year’s Eve or else the New Year will bring poverty. Many banks replace old money for new bills. In addition, never lend money to someone on New Year’s Day or else you will be lending money every day of the New Year!

Exactly at the stroke of midnight on New Year’s Eve, all doors and windows are opened to let out the old year’s spirits and allow the good spirits for the New Year to enter. Firecrackers are lit to scare away the old, evil spirits, making way for the new, good spirits. In addition, the Dragon Dance is performed through the streets just to make sure that the old spirits are chased away.

Everyone must refrain from using foul language, bad, and unlucky words. Negative terms and the word “four” (Ssu), which sounds like the word for death, are not to be uttered. Never mention death or ghosts as well as anything that happened in the old year.

If you cry on New Year’s Day, you will cry every day during the New Year. [Children are rarely punished on New Year’s Day due to this tradition]. Also, do not wash your hair on New Year’s Day as it is believed that you have just washed away all of your good luck!

Everything is red on Chinese New Year, the color that brings a sunny and bright future. Children and unmarried children each receive a little red envelope (lai see) containing money to ensure their good fortunes throughout the entire year.

The first person you meet in the New Year has great significance on how the year will become. The same applies for the first words you say or hear on New Year’s Day. It is a lucky sign to see or hear songbirds, red-colored birds, or swallows on New Year’s Day.

Do not use knives or scissors on New Year’s Day as this may cut off your fortune.

Last but not least, always consult the almanac before you leave your house on New Year’s Day. There are good and bad times to go outside, and if you leave at the wrong time, then bad fortune will be with you for the entire year.
